Course description:

This course aims to familiarise students with the basic concepts of international law of the sea and the legal protection of the sea on a global and regional level. Participants will become acquainted with the applicable rules applying to the activities at sea, thereby enabling participants to develop a critical understanding for contemporary maritime issues: fisheries, criminal acts (piracy, drug trafficking, migrant smuggling, etc.), protection of the environment, human rights, etc.

Prerequisites:

Students should have a keen interest in the sea and the maritime activities and their protection by means of international standards; no previous legal knowledge required.
